Travel was restricted and we were told to stay home and not venture out. Millions suddenly found themselves unemployed. Hand sanitizer, toilet paper, and face masks seemingly became as valuable as gold.

In the blink of an eye we were reminded of the words of Jesus. *“So don’t worry about tomorrow for tomorrow will bring its own worries. Today’s trouble is enough for today.”* (Matt. 6:34). We might have also remembered the words of Peter. *“Give all your worries and cares to God, for he cares about you.”* (1 Peter 5:7). We were challenged to heed the words of Paul. *“Don’t worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done.”* (Phil. 4:6).

Suddenly, we realized there is still a long way to go. We struggled to know how to respond, but we knew that silence was no longer an option. Some of us participated in local, peaceful demonstrations demanding justice and change. Others intentionally began having conversations with our African-American brothers and sisters. We wanted to try and understand their experiences. As we listened to their painful stories, we had no way to process what we were hearing. Again we struggled with knowing how to respond.

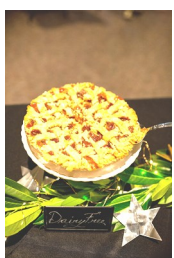

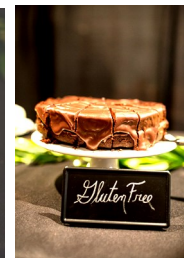
## Cameroon School of Practical Ministry

The nation of Cameroon is located just south of Nigeria on the coast of West Africa. Through your partnership, Evangel has had the privilege of teaching the School of Practical Ministry (SOPM) to pastors and church leaders in this nation since 2012. In February of this year, just prior to Covid 19 shutting everything down, our most recent class of 40 students completed the program and received their certificates. (see pictures above)

To date over 400 men and women have received this life giving, life changing training which has had a significant positive impact on Cameroon. Our in country ministry partner, Hope Outreach International, has estimated that well over 1,000,000,000 people have been impacted by graduates of Evangel's SOPM program through in person ministry or through Christian teaching programs over the radio airwaves. This is the difference your gifts to Evangel are making. Thanks to your generosity, this next generation of pastors and church leaders are now far better equipped to reach people in their country with the truth of God's amazing love and saving grace.



## Did Someone Say Dessert??



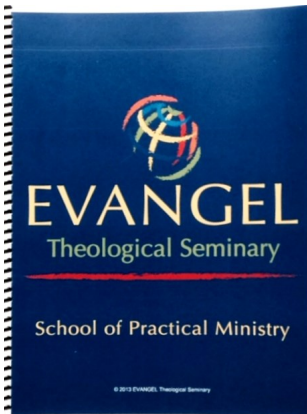

# SOPM Revision

The School of Practical Ministry is the flagship material we use to train pastors and church leaders in developing nations. Initially developed in 2007, the material is taken from seminary curriculum written by Dr. Bob Reichard, founder of Evangel Theological Seminary.

Although this is excellent material that has blessed pastors and church leaders from the U.S. and developing nations for the past 13 years, we have been sensing the urging of the Lord to revise the SOPM curriculum. This revision is providing opportunity to add new material, to update other information and to take out some material that isn't well understood in cultural settings outside of the U.S.

Previously, the SOPM was organized into 7 Learning Modules and 3 Learning Projects. We have now reorganized the curriculum into 3 main sections; Building the Foundation, Understanding the Call, and Serving the Kingdom. We are adding new material in the areas of Godly Leadership, Effective Communication and Spiritual Gifting. In addition, we are reworking our Church History curriculum so that it more accurately reflects the rich racial and ethnic diversity manifested in the Church from the day of Pentecost through the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

The end result of these additions and revisions will enhance and strengthen this innovative program for the foreseeable future. Our goal is to have this revision completed by the fall.



- The School of Practical Ministry has been taught to more than 1,300 men and women from 7 countries?
- Evangel Seminary partners with "in country" ministries to provide the international SOPM training? We only go where we are invited as the funds are available.
- The overwhelming majority of pastors in developing nations have little to no formal training because it is either non-existent or it is too expensive?
- ETS has never charged a fee for the SOPM training? The reason is that most of these pastors are bi-vocational and their level of income is astoundingly low.
- We also train and certify native instructors to continue the SOPM training in our absence? This makes the program sustainable, portable and accessible to more students.
- Finances for the International SOPM program are all raised here in the U.S.? Without your generous and often sacrificial support, these pastors and church leaders would have no hope of receiving any type of formal sound Biblical training.

We began earnestly asking the Holy Spirit to show us how we practically fulfill the mandate spoken by God through the prophet, Isaiah. ***"No, this is the kind of fasting I want: Free those who are wrongly imprisoned; lighten the burden of those who work for you. Let the oppressed go free, and remove the chains that bind people."*** (Is. 58:6)

At the top of the first page, I quoted 3 verses from Jer. 29. I believe they are incredibly relevant for us today as we try to figure out where we go from here. God spoke to His people through a letter written by Jeremiah. The Babylonians had ransacked Jerusalem, torn down its walls, and burned the Temple. Now, the Israelites were living in exile.

For centuries God had warned his people of coming judgment and implored them to repent. They ignored His warnings and now they were dealing with the consequences. God never said "I told you so." He never said, "Make the best of the mess you've made." Instead God communicated His love and care for His people. He told them He had good plans for them and that they had a future. He even told them that if they sought Him wholeheartedly they would find Him.



The great news through all of this is that God has life changing plans, hope, and a future for each of us. All around us are people who desperately need to hear the Good News of Jesus. Let's determine to live out Kingdom principles in our communities. Finally, let's walk in the power and boldness of the Holy Spirit and minister the life giving love of Jesus.

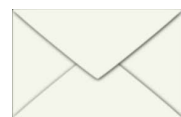
